WHERE WOULD NORTH BRENT SCHOOL BE LOCATED? At this stage we do not have a confirmed site. If our application is approved we will work quickly with Government and Brent Council to confirm a site as soon as possible.

#### **HOW WOULD STUDENTS BE ADMITTED?**

North Brent School would be open to all local students, irrespective of faith, gender or ethnicity. North Brent School would comply with legal requirements and the School Admissions Code, and its over-subscription criteria would then prioritise siblings (from the second year of opening), children of staff and local students.

- local schools are heavily over-subscribed: the sponsoring schools

   Year 7 entry in 2016, including almost 1,000 first preferences for
   the 670 available places.

#### WHO IS PROPOSING NORTH BRENT SCHOOL?

North Brent School is supported by Brent Secondary Heads and Brent Council and is being proposed by Claremont High School, Queens Park Community School, and Wembley High Technology College. These three schools are all very popular with parents, educationally successful, and share a similar ethos and approach to ensuring that children achieve their potential. The vision for North Brent School is founded upon the tried and tested success of the sponsoring schools.

Ms Bal, the Executive Headteacher of Wembley High Technology College, will lead North Brent School in addition to her Wembley High role. Ms Bal will ensure that North Brent School adopts the values and practices that work successfully at Claremont, Queens Park and Wembley High.

# WHAT WOULD THE ETHOS OF NORTH BRENT SCHOOL BE?

North Brent School will be an academically stretching school that focuses upon achieving very strong educational outcomes for every student, both in absolute terms and by progress from their starting point.

#### These strong outcomes will be achieved through:

- a culture of very high expectations for all and no excuses background does not limit achievement;
- excellent recruitment and training and development of staff;
- attention to detail throughout the school, from expectations of uniform and behaviour, through effective management of resources, to measuring the impact of interventions upon progress and achievement.

### WHAT WOULD STUDENTS LEARN?

The curriculum will be academic, because we know that all children can and should succeed. Every lesson will have clear learning objectives, with differentiated activities to stretch all students. Success in the English Baccalaureate will be the norm. North Brent School will have a particular focus upon STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths).

The Key Stage 3 curriculum in Years 7 and 8 would include approximately half of the timetable for English, Maths and Science. The broad and balanced curriculum would include humanities, art, design and technology, PE, drama, music and ICT / computing. There would be structured programmes to support those who did not achieve Level 4 at Key Stage 2 and to stretch those with particular strengths in different subjects (including setting in Maths from Year 7).

The Key Stage 4 curriculum would have a core GCSE curriculum in English, Maths, Science (setting from Year 9) and PE. Students would then select three further GCSE options, which would be expected to include at least one humanities subject and at least one language.

The compulsory school day and school year at North Brent School would be similar to other local schools, with opportunity for extra-curricular activities beyond the core day.
